alacrity

noun | (uh-LACK-ruh-tee)

promptness in response

Miss Bingley moved with *alacrity* to the piano-forte. (ch. 10)

laconic

adjective | (luh-CON-ick)

using a minimum of words

But their father, though very laconic in his expressions of pleasure, was really glad to see them. (ch. 12)

petulance

noun | (PEH-chew-lunce)

the quality or state of being rude in speech or behavior

Elizabeth is grateful that Darcy can forgive "all the *petulance* and acrimony of her manner of rejecting him" (253).

acrimony

noun | (A-kra-moe-nee)

harsh or biting sharpness especially of words, manner, or feelings

Elizabeth is grateful that Darcy can forgive "all the petulance and acrimony of her manner of rejecting him" (253).

incredulity

noun | (in-creh-DOO-luh-dee)

disbelief

"[I]t was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity" (7).

requisition

noun | (wreck-wuh-ZISH-un)

the act of formally requiring or calling upon someone to perform an action

"[T]he hangman, ever busy and ever worse than useless, was in constant requisition" (9).

auspicious

adj | (aus-PISH-us

favorable; advantageous

That, he had been the prisoner's friend, but, at once in an *auspicious* and an evil hour detecting his infamy. (ch. 3)

pernicious

adj | (per-NISH-us)

subtly destructive or harmful

The proof would go back five years, and would show the prisoner already engaged in these *pernicious* missions.

incommodious

adjective | (in-kuh-MODE-ee-us)

uncomfortable; inconvenient

Tellson's bank is described as "very small, very dark, very ugly, very incommodious." (Book the Second, ch. 1)

obstinacy

noun | (AHB-stun-uh-see)

the state of stubborn

Even the door at Tellson's had an "idiotic obstinacy." (Book the Second, ch. 1)

incorrigible

adjective | (in-CORE-uh-juh-bul)

incapable of being reformed; irredeemable

As to me—will you never understand that I am incorrigible?" (ch. 11)

magnanimous

adjective | (mag-NAN-uh-mus)

benevolent; kind-hearted

Mr. Striver having made up his mind to that *magnanimous* bestowal of good fortune upon the Doctor's daughter" (ch. 12)
