petulant

adjective | PEH-choo-lunt)

insolent or rude in speech or behavior

Dorian acted in a willful, *petulant* manner. (ch 2)

abstruse

adj | (ab-STROOS)

difficult to comprehend

Lord Henry finds the topic of women not as abstruse as he once thought. (ch 4)

reticent

adjective | (RET-uh-cent)

inclined to be silent or uncommunicative in speech

Basil was known for his reticent demeanor. (ch. 9)

garrulous

adi | (GAR-u-lus)

pointlessly or annoyingly talkative

Dorian's garrulous housekeeper continued despite his sighs. (ch 10)

inveterate

adj | (in-VET-er-ate)

firmly established by long persistence

The artists with whom Mr. Hubbard dealt were *inveterately* impecunious. (ch. 10)

impecunious

adjective | (im-puh-QUOO-knee-us)

having very little or no money

The artists with whom Mr. Hubbard dealt were inveterately impecunious. (ch. 10)

panache

noun (pan-ASH)

dash or flamboyance in style and action

Like his character Dorian Gray, author Oscar Wilde was known for his *panache*.

supercilious

adj | (soo-per-SILL-e-us)

coolly and patronizingly haughty

Tom Buchanan "was a sturdy straw-haired man of thirty with a rather hard mouth and a supercilious manner" (7).

punctilious

adi | (punk-TILL-e-us)

marked by or concerned about precise accordance with the details of convention

This quality was continually breaking through his punctilious manner in the shape of restlessness. (ch. 4)

contemptuous

adj | (con-TEM-choo-us)

manifesting, feeling, or expressing deep hatred or disapproval; showing contempt

He knew women early, and since they spoiled him he became contemptuous of them . . . (ch. 6)

permeate

verb| (PER-mee-ate)

to spread or diffuse through

The bar is in full swing and floating sounds of cocktails *permeate* the garden outside . . . (ch. 3)

vestige

noun | (VEST-uge)

a trace, mark or visible sign left by something

They were sitting at either end of the couch . . . and every vestige of embarrassment was gone (ch.5)
